SECTION	ROW	GRAVE	NOTES
B	2	65	<b>TAYLOR (Dawson) Isabella:</b> Born in 1842 Only child of James and Joan Dawson. Friend of the Aborigines, student of their languages and culture.
B	2	64	<b>TAYLOR William:</b> Born in Scotland and immigrated to Camperdown in 1876. Farmer and civic leader. Gifted the World's oldest statue of Robert Burns to the people of Camperdown.
A	13	42	<b>WALKER Duncan Stewart:</b> Hotel owner. Owned the Leura Hotel from 1864 to 1869. Duncan was on the first board of directors at the Cobden Butter Factory. He died in 1889 at his home 'Dimora' in Dimora Avenue Camperdown.
B	10	25	<b>WALLS John:</b> Came to 'Old Timboon' in 1853. In 1854 moved to Manifold Street (West end) and established a blacksmith and coachbuilding business. Served as postmaster until 1863 and was the town's first undertaker.

SECTION	ROW	GRAVE	NOTES
C	5		<b>ABORIGINAL MONUMENT - PUYUUN - WOMBEETCH:</b> Stands in the centre of the cemetery in the memory of the Aborigines (many with unknown graves) of the district.
C	10	28	<b>ARTHUR James:</b> Constable. Stationed in Camperdown 1902 - 1914. Held a posting in Benalla where he took part in the search for the Kelly gang. Died in 1924 aged 70 years.
D	2	35	<b>BAKER Edmund:</b> Died 1854. Was the first burial in the cemetery. He was a boundary-rider who died from injuries he received when thrown from his horse at Koort Koort Nong Station.
D	1	40	<b>BAMFORD Margaret:</b> Arrived at Port Phillip in 1844, with her husband John and young family and settled at Pomborneit. Margaret is believed to be the first woman to be buried at the Camperdown Cemetery. Died in 1857.
B	10	27	<b>BARNET Rev. John:</b> Was the first resident Presbyterian minister in Camperdown. He drowned in a flooded creek on his way to conduct a service at "Keayang" station, near Terang on 24 November 1857.
A	11	63	<b>BROWN William:</b> A stonemason who helped build the Clock Tower.
B	11	5	<b>CURDIE Daniel:</b> Doctor. Dr Curdie was the first President of the Shire of Hampden and also the first doctor in the area from 1840 onwards.
B	2	1	<b>DAWSON James:</b> Arrived in Melbourne from Scotland in 1840. In 1868 he moved to Camperdown. The Aborigines of the Western District had no better friend than James Dawson. He spent a great part of his life protecting their interests. With the help of his daughter Isabella who could speak the dialects of the local tribes, he wrote the book "Australian Aborigines" in 1881.

LAWN 1	H	38	<b>LAMB Harold:</b> From 1960 built up a large collection of horse drawn vehicles. Was heavily involved with many community and sporting organisations.
B	12	26	<b>McARTHUR Peter:</b> Station owner. Arrived in the district in 1839 and established a sheep station 'Meningoort'. The McArthur family still own and live at 'Meningoort'.
D	14	1	<b>McCABE John:</b> Stonemason. Builder of 'Old Timboon House' and many other fine buildings in and around Camperdown.
D	14	84	<b>McCABE Michael:</b> Architect. His work includes the Clock Tower, St Patrick's, the three hotels and the family home, No. 9 Campbell Street.
B	12	35-37	<b>McDONALD FAMILY:</b> Arrived from Scotland in 1848. In 1868 moved to Camperdown on purchasing the Camperdown Hotel. The headstone lists six of their children.
B	1	7	<b>McNICOL Donald:</b> Shepherd, store owner and pastoralist. Arrived in the area in 1839 to work for Neil Black at Mt Noorat. Purchased land at Old Timboon c1848.
B	12	47	<b>McNICOL Duncan:</b> Arrived in Australia in 1839 with his brother Donald. In 1845 he acquired land at 'Old Timboon' and in 1848 the brothers opened the first store and post office in the area.
C	12	52 & 53	<b>MANIFOLD Peter &amp; John:</b> First European settlers to arrive in the Camperdown District. Arrived in the district in 1838 from Tasmania. Settled beside the fresh water lake 'Purrumbete'. Manifold family are connected to a lot of Camperdown's history.
B	11	37	<b>TAIT James:</b> Arrived in Australia in 1854 and moved to Camperdown in 1857. Purchased land in Scott Street and his bluestone 'Camperdown Store' was built soon after.
